BIRDATHON 88 THE SWEET SMELL OF SUCCESS !



Save the Oxbow Society

Have you ever seen 134 species of birds in a day? Do you doubt the possibility of recording this number within a 50 mile radius of downtown Cincinnati? You say it couldn't be done? Well, dispel all doubts! It WAS done by a team of three professors from the University of Cincinnati as part of Oxbow, Inc.'s BIRDATHON '88.

Starting at 5 PM Friday, May 6th, and ending at 5 PM Saturday, May 7th, Mike Braun, Steve Pelican and Dave Styer, with Joanne Olman as their designated driver, traveled over 500 miles and recorded an award winning 134 species by birding continuously for most of the 24 hours. Their final species, a mockingbird, was not recorded until 20 minutes before the 5 PM deadline. The bird was seen at Farbach-Werner Nature Preserve at Poole Road and Colerain Avenue, where all the teams met for the final tally. The U.C. team now holds the Championship "Golden Starling" Trophy. Sculptured by David Might of the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History, the golden bird is mounted upon a pair of golden binoculars embedded in a golden rock.

The Museum team finished second with 128 species. Dr. Robert Kennedy, Curator of Vertebrate Zoology, Jack Dumbacher, Jeff Belth, Linda Franklin and Pete Whan suffered a severe setback even before they started. The team had arrived at the Oxbow in time to allow for a leisurely view of eight or nine species of shorebirds present. Anticipating a running jump on the other teams, they were dismayed, when just before the 5 PM starting time, the entire flock was frightened into flight by a Cooper's hawk that had entered the area. Man proposes, God disposes! Fortunately, all of the lost species were recorded at a later hour.

The Cincinnati Nature Center team of Jim Anno, Jim Berry and David Helm took third place with 125 species.
Other teams in order of finish were:

Paul Wharton and Cindy Sibrel - 107

The Bush Thrashers - Carol Thurman, Jim Mundy and Pat Quackenbush -102. Wolf Track Outfitters, Pat's store which specializes in hiking and camping gear, sponsored the Bush Thrashers.

Oxbow, Inc.'s team of George Laycock, Karl Maslowski and Jay Stenger picked up many of their 101 species Friday while driving to Adams County where they spent the night in George's cabin before returning Saturday via Meldahl Dam, Lake Grant and East Fork Lake.

Individuals, who were not sponsored but wished to participate on a non-competitive basis, diligently recruited pledges from family, friends and neighbors. Sister Marty Dermody, a teacher at Saint Ursula Villa, and Bill Bocklage turned in a high total of 90 species. Norma Flannery and Paul Hellmann, while recording only 71 species, turned in over \$700, the highest total pledged in the individual category.

Overall, there were 43 birders who participated. 35 were on 11 teams and eight were individuals. We extend our sincere gratitude to all of them for the energy and excitement they injected into the competition. The total number of recordable bird species was 178.

While all of the pledges have not been received as the NEWSLETTER goes to print, we expect to add \$7000 to the Land Acquisition Fund from BIRDATHON '88. We thank those who entered, either actively searching for birds, or by pledging a donation. Each created a share of the success of BIRDATHON '88, and for that we thank you.
