BIRDATHON '89 HITS THE HIGH NOTES.

BIRDATHON '89 was a great success, socially as well as financially. Everyone agreed it was great fun and with all the birds to count they didn't even notice the light morning rains. Even the picnic dinner of hot dogs, baked beans and cole slaw, when shared with friends, was outstanding.

The competition was friendly but intense. As the teams returned to Farbach-Werner on Saturday for the check-in, they wouldn't even reply to a friendly, "How did you do?"

The total number of species that each team observed over the 24 hour BIRDATHON '89 period was kept secret until the official listings revealed the winner. At first it looked like it would be a repeat of BIRDATHON '88 in which the University of Cincinnati had been the winner, with the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History and the Cincinnati Nature Center closely following. But this year a surprise was in store. The winners, with 156 recorded species, was the Oxbow, Inc. #2 team of Paul Wharton and Joe Bens. The #2 team had been a recently formed team in which each partner had had free time to scout the best territories and to get their rare birds "all in a row." UC was second with 152 compared to their winning 134 species last year. The GOLDEN STARLING AWARD flew from the hands of Dave Styer and Steve Pelikan to the shoulders of Paul Wharton and Joe Bens where it will perch until BIRDATHON '90.

The real winner, of course, was Oxbow, Inc. through the financial contributions of all those who pledged to support their favorite birder or team. Although all of the pledges have not been received as of this printing, it seems probable that the estimate of \$12,000 will be exceeded. BIRDATHON '89 receipts go into the land acquisition fund and will be used to secure the 189 acres which Oxbow, Inc. recently contracted to purchase.

Incidentally, if YOU have not made a pledge there is still time. Send your check marked "BIRDATHON '89" to Oxbow, Inc., 2073 Harrison Avenue, Cincinnati, OH 45214. Contributions received have ranged from \$3.00 to \$312.00 and are tax deductible.

The tremendous success of BIRDATHON '89 was due to the energy expended by the people involved. Oxbow, Inc. wants to thank all of our members and their friends who so generously contributed. Many, many pledges were received, ranging from 5¢ to \$2.00 per species. Thank you for your support.

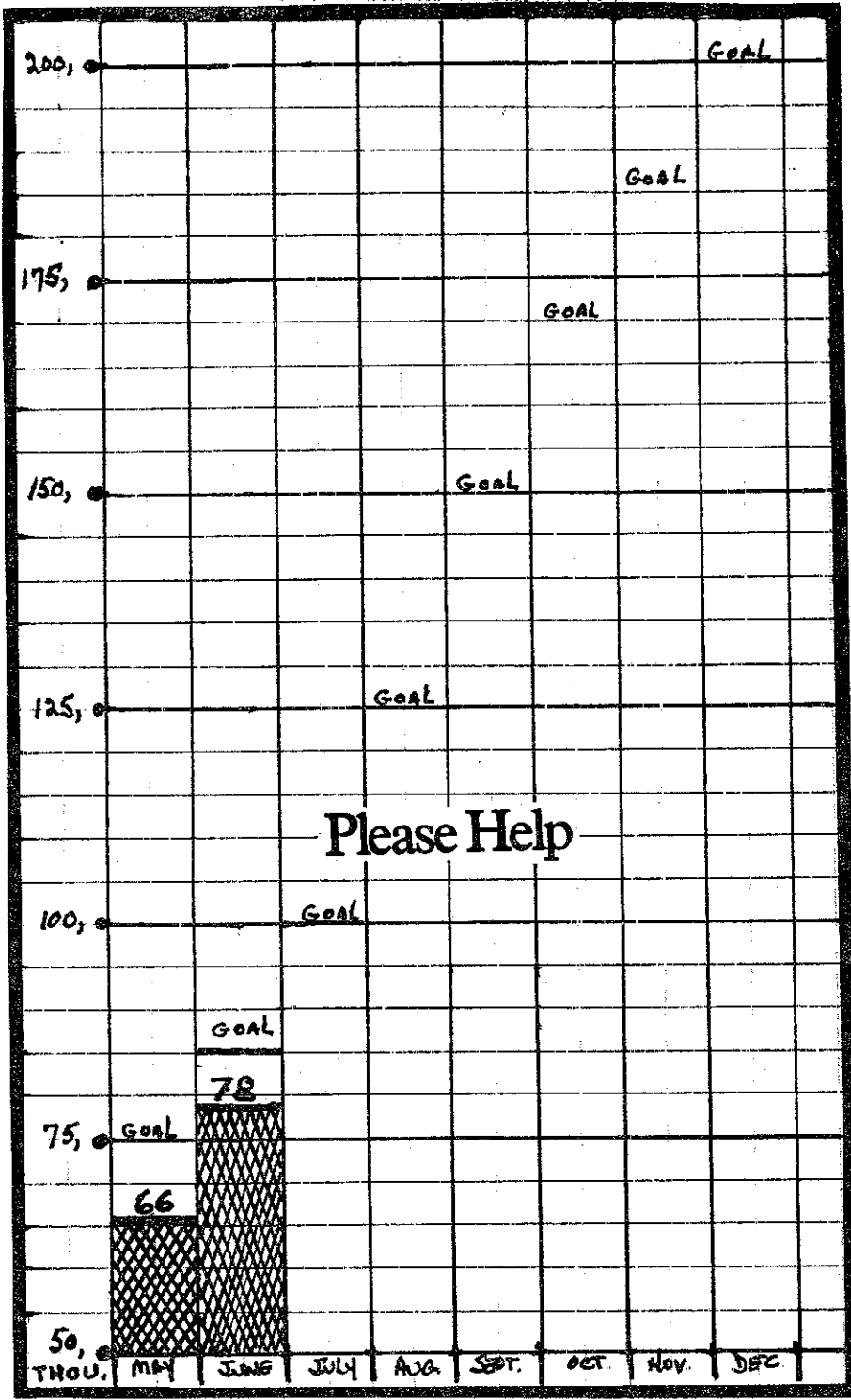

THE HAMILTON COUNTY PARK DISTRICT has furnished Oxbow, Inc. a map of Shawnee Lookout Park which depicts 200 acres on the east side of the Great Miami River as part of Shawnee Lookout Park. The new map below shows a more accurate picture of the current size of the park in the Oxbow area. The new map designates this area, owned by the park, as Uhlmansiek Wildlife Sanctuary and drops the 200 acres from "property to be purchased."

The May-June, 1989 WETLAND MATTERS overstated the Park District's policy and plans. To correctly state the Park District's position, WETLAND MATTERS is printing a recent letter to Norma Flannery, President, from James A.D. Geier, President of the Board of Park Commissioners which outlined the Hamilton County Park District land acquisition policy:

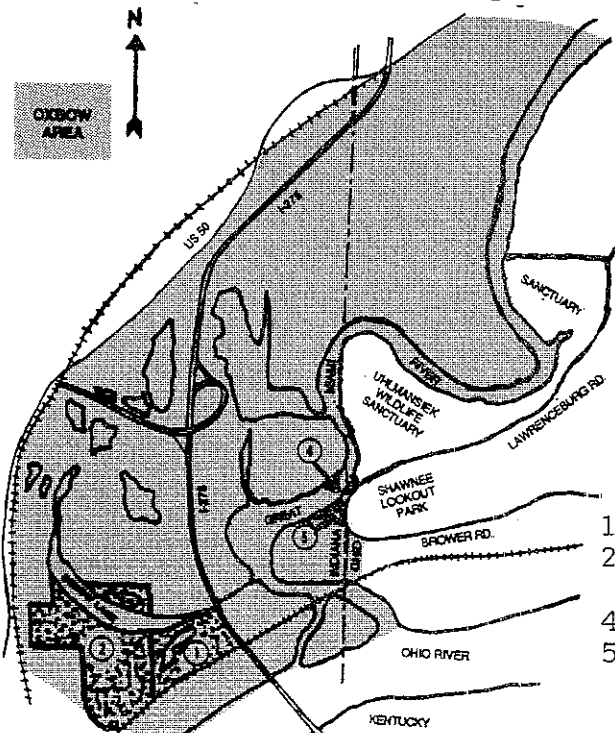
...."By law, decisions on land acquisitions by the Park District may be made only by a favorable vote of the Board of Park Commissioners. Although the Park District staff is currently studying the possibilities of acquisitions in the Oxbow area, no decisions have been made up to this date by the Board of Park Commissioners.

The Board and staff of the Park District commend the officers and members of Oxbow, Inc. for their on-going dedication to the conservation of this unique wetlands area.

A primary function of the Park District is the conservation of the natural resources within Hamilton County. We, therefore, have a deep interest in the Oxbow, as well as in dozens of other areas throughout the county, where conservation and preservation are equally important.

The Park District intends to continue its study of possibilities to preserve lands in the Oxbow and will welcome your suggestions, advice and cooperation.

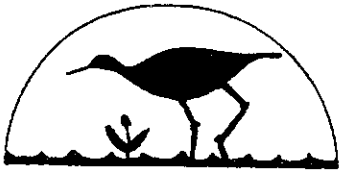
When opportunities to acquire land in the Oxbow or elsewhere present themselves, the Board will carefully consider each proposal on its merits in accordance with our obligations to all of the citizens and taxpayers of Hamilton County. As future land acquisitions are completed, they will of course, be announced publicly."

FIELD NOTES



Rain had fallen most of the day on May 15th, but by 6 p.m. it was clear and the sun had come out to light the flooded Oxbow area. With the Ohio River stage at 45 feet, the Oxbow lake and surrounding fields were flooded and the walk was a short one down towards the lake. Double-crested cormorants were at the lake and some were perched in trees, wings spread, for drying.

Under I-275, behind the little cemetery we could see the flooded fields along the Great Miami River. With the soft light from the late evening sun, the view was beautiful.

There were seven great egrets, several great blue herons, a few cattle egrets, a flock of 20 Canada geese, mallards, noisy killdeer, greater and lesser yellowlegs, several semipalmated and black-bellied plovers, and ruddy turnstones being watched over by turkey vultures lazily floating in the evening dusk. The plovers and turnstones called for more than one look through the scope. They were beautiful, in full breeding plumage. We saw common and Caspian terns, some in the fields, others diving for their supper. There must have been a thousand gulls in the area. At times large flocks would take off in a fear flight, only to circle and land again. Most were ring-billed and herring gulls, but we did see Bonapart's gulls also. At times the sights and sounds were more reminiscent of a sea coast than the riverbottoms in southern Indiana and Ohio.

It was a nice evening to be afield.
