BIRDATHON '91 - PROGRAM REPORT.



"Wait 'til next year!"

Those words wrapped up last year's Birdathon as Joe Bens and Paul Wharton handed over the Golden Starling Award to Dave Styer's winning U.C. team.

BIRDING the CINCINNATI

The final tally of BIRDATHON '91 found Dave passing the Golden Starling Award once more into the hands of Oxbow, Inc.'s No.2 team, the "Fire and Brimstone Birder's Guild". Joe and Paul added two additional members, Tony Luekering and Tim Smert, and recorded a winning 150 species. The U.C. team had to be satisfied with second place with 144 species. "Birds-R-Us", competing for Gilmore Ponds were third with 142 species. The "Bluegrass Buteos", birding only in Boone County, Kentucky, were able to record a respectable total of 108 species to finish in eighth place.

Eighteen sponsored teams, comprised of 60 birders competed for the coveted Award. Five Individual-Reporting-Non-Competitive teams, represented by 17 birders, also participated in the final tally.

The temperature and humidity soared this year and brought as much grumbling from the hot, tired birders as did last year's cold, penetrating rain. However, hot or cold, humid or rainy, the birders came in with a total of 200 species, the same number as they recorded in 1990 but of differing species.

Following, on page two, is the list of all of the species that were reported by sponsored competing teams. The total number of teams reporting the species is carried to the left. If three or less teams reported a bird, the finishing position number of the team is listed to the right. Team finishing position numbers are printed on page three.

As of mid-June pledge collections are running slightly ahead of 1990. The \$9,000 collected to date contributes greatly to the success of Oxbow, Inc.'s conservation easement program.


Wouldn't it be exciting if Jon's efforts are taken as a challenge by other team birders and their co-workers!

A HISTORY OF THE OXBOW AREA.

PART 9 - HARDINTOWN.

Hardintown is a little-known locality in the heart of the Oxbow. The area, usually referred to as Greendale, is actually on the nearby elevated terrace north of Lawrenceburg at the intersection of U.S. Route 50 and the I-275 Lawrence-burg-Greendale exit ramp. Hardintown was settled in the early 1800's but few buildings from that time remain.

Hardintown was originally located on the shore of a loop of the Great Miami River, far to the west of the present course of the river. The loop was called "Horseshoe Bend." The river, at this point, was deep enough for steamboats to come up from the Ohio River and dock at Hardintown. An extensive importexport business flourished here in the early 1800's, with the importing of consumer goods and the exporting of farm products.

This shipping business was probably started by Alexander Guard who settled in 1793 on an island in the river near Hardintown. Guard's Island today is a section of low floodplain just downstream and across from the Shawnee Lookout Park boat ramp. Guard shipped many flat-boats loaded with corn and livestock from here to New Orleans and other downriver points.

The Whitewater Canal passed through Hardintown, but both the canal and its attendant prosperity were short-lived. Hardintown's steamboat boom-days were also short lived. In November of 1847, torrential rains caused flooding of all of the area streams. A new channel was cut across Horseshoe Bend, and the Great Miami River's present course was established closer to Shawnee Lookout Park.

Hardintown was left, high and dry, two miles from the river. The abandoned Horseshoe Bend channel is what is known today as the Oxbow lake.

STEAMBOAT 'ROUND THE BEND!

"ALWAYS A RIVER" is coming to the Cincinnati riverfront July 15th - 22nd. The flagship of this Ohio River experience is a floating exhibition on a specially fabricated barge, 152 feet long by 34 feet wide. The barge left Pittsburgh May 22nd and will make 18 stops along the Ohio before docking in Cairo, IL in September.

Visitors will be greeted by Captain Dana Young, an Ohio River Pilot for 50 years. At each stop, vials of water taken from each tributary will be affixed to an entry-way map during an Indian-led ceremony of the "gathering of the waters." Oral history stations invite visitors to share their special stories. Local residents who are knowledgeable about the river and its communities will serve as trained interpreters. There will be demonstrations of crafts, story tellers, and folk musicians to share their lore.

Each area of the exhibit provides some adventure. There will be models of a lock and dam, a grist mill, a barn, boats, an 18th-century fort, and a topographical depiction of the Ohio River cutting and building new channels and banks.

Visitors will walk through 11 exhibits, some depicting the river and its tributaries, its geological history and pre-historic dwellers, surveying and mapping, navigation, and the story of its environment and the importance of the river's ecosystem.

"Always A River" is sponsored by the National Endowment for the Humanities and by the Humanities Councils of the six states, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, and Illinois, bordering the Ohio River.

At each stop, local communities will organize festivals and riverside events to coincide with the barge's arrival. Oxbow, Inc. will need **VOLUNTEERS** to hand out information during the week the barge is in Cincinnati. As WETLAND MATTERS goes to press, the times volunteers will be asked to work is not available.
